

In August, our members were treated to a special presentation by the Los Angeles Police Department K-9 and Mounted Units at Travel Town!




2 Eagle Scout Projects - Updating our "Tracks to Learning"!

Five years ago, the Travel Town Museum Foundation received a grant to design and paint the "tracks to learning" designs in front of the volunteer center and in near the picnic area in front of the Trolley. If you are the parent of a little one, you have probably seen your youngsters "play train," chase each other on the tracks, or used small toys on the tracks on the concrete tables in the picnic areas. The Foundation received a grant from the "Kaboom!" organization, a non-profit that work to end playspace inequity by uniting with communities to build kid-designed playspaces. The Foundation uses the tracks to teach school groups about train building and movement, using the kiddos themselves to "be" engines and cars that need to be made into a train. 5 years, plenty of playtime and hundreds of tennis shoes later, our tracks were getting a little sad-looking. Two Eagle Scout candidates came to the rescue and helped us renovate these tracks!

Josh Vaysman from Troop 36 in Los Angeles and Julian Guerrero from Troop 21 in the Rose Bowl District both stepped up to prep, mask and repaint these tracks. Josh went the extra mile and actually added a "yard" feature to the red and blue tracks, so now there is even MORE trackage to run around on! The Museum Foundation is always happy to work with these young men (and women) who are developing their leadership skills while helping out their communities. We've Been workin' on the Railroad

Restoration on the outside of a railroad car is difficult enough, but working inside is even harder. Our dining car, which quietly celebrated her 100 birthday in the midst of the Covid Closure, has been going through quite a change inside. Restoration manager Brad Slosar has repainted the kitchen and pantry areas of the car, and is now working in the main dining room. Below are pictures of the ceiling work being done. This ceiling was 100 year old hardboard (I know it as Masonite) that had warped, all the paint had cracked, and the glass light fixtures had been cracked or damaged. Our team has removed the panels and cut new hard-board (not necessarily an easy task, considering the center large panels are 5 feet in each direction, and most sheets of hard-board are only 4 x 8 – so hello special order!) Holes have been drilled for the correct spacing of the light and fan fixtures, but there is still pin-striping to do on over 36 panels in the car! Below are pictures of volunteer Tanner Rosenberg excellently priming and painting the clerestory panels and molding, and high school volunteer Ernesto Montes de Oca priming other overhead panels, overseen by Executive Director Nancy Gneier. Panels are painted outside the car, so there is a lot of carrying going on, too! Next steps involve re-wiring the light and fan fixtures and converting the lights to regular 110 voltage. The bottom picture is a detail shot of the pin-striping – 36 panels to go, and probably and expensive proposition! We've Been workin' on the Railroad (PART 2)

Because the caboose always comes at the end of the train, we've put these pictures of the work on our narrow gauge caboose at the end of our newsletter! Here is the write up from our volunteer F.G Vincent:

Three weeks ago, Bob (Frein) & I were asked to see what we could do to "clean up" the end platform of the Oahu Railway narrow gauge caboose. Its the little gray caboose on the freeway-side at the end of track. After decades of neglect, the platform on the east end of the car was badly damaged from weather, termites and just plain age.

Built in the late 1890's, this little caboose has hung in there a very long time but is slowly giving in to gravity. There are beams under her to hold her up straight, and her platforms and handrails, etc. are literally falling off.

So Bob and I went to work: We pulled off the rotted wood down to what is left of her wooden frame, and rebuilt her a new platform, a "box" end-sill, buffer block and coupler carrier. We realigned the handrails and brake-wheel and gently bolted her back together.

We removed the old plywood door and replaced it with plexiglass so now you can see inside.

While we worked on the door, volunteers Ernesto Montes de oca and Darren Kwan paint the "new" platform

and end-sill.
