On the Platform – Andre Clarizio



We at the Museum are very fortunate to have a new, highly skilled volunteer, Andre Clarizio! Andre is a longtime family friend of Greg and Nancy, and his volunteering has really energized our restoration work and several projects here at the Museum.

I was born in Glendale. and continue to live in Glendale with my wife Marianna, and my two children, Serafina and Angelo.

I feel like I've always been very mechanical. Working with my hands started at a very early age for me. My parents owned rental property and they would take me along to help do repairs. I think I replaced my first garbage disposal when I was 8 years old! Of course, as you can imagine, doing the maintenance at the buildings allowed me to learn how to do all types of handy projects.

In school, I took all the shop classes and rebuilt my first engine when I was 15. After high school, I wasn't sure what I wanted as a career. I enjoyed working on cars and decided to attend Universal Technical Institute to begin a career in automotive repair. I specialized in automatic transmissions and worked at Kings transmissions, In Glendale, for 4 years. During those 4 years I stumbled upon my passion..... I wanted to be a firefighter!

After working for several fire departments, I finally landed a job at the Huntington Beach Fire Department. I worked as a Firefighter/Paramedic for 8 years and then promoted to Engineer (the apparatus driver) of which was the position I retired from. I was also a member of our Urban Search & Rescue Team as well as our Hazardous Materials Team. Working as a firefighter for 30 years and being part of the specialty teams, exposed me to many situations and taught me many skills that I have already put into use at Travel Town.

What is the beginning of your interest in trains?

Although I am intrigued and amazed when standing next to the trains at travel town, the true lover of trains in our family is my son Angelo. Through him, my interest grew. He continues to love and play with train sets and most of what I know comes from what he has learned and shares with me. His favorite railcar is the "Doodlebug" which happens to be one of the railcars at the museum (the M-177). We both have had the opportunity to do some work on it and for Angelo, it's a dream come true! For me, I am amazed at the ingenuity, the engineering, the perseverance, and of course the history of these engines that shaped our country.

Why do you volunteer at Travel Town?

My connection with Travel Town started when my kids were young. We visited the park many times as visitors as well as with our girl scout and boy scout troops. At the time, one of the vehicles on display happened to be an old Seagrave fire engine that was used by the very fire department I worked for. It was a 1922 Seagrave Fire Pumper and was the very first motorized fire engine that Huntington Beach purchased. This fire engine

literally replaced the horse drawn apparatus. Little did I know, but I was going to become very intimate with that engine. In 2002, our Fire Chief wanted the engine to come back to Huntington Beach for restoration. He traded a fork lift for the engine. Because of the difficulty and high cost to restore it, the engine sat for another 5 years in storage. In 2007, our firefighters association made a deal with the city to buy the engine for \$1 and we would do the restoration ourselves. Myself along with a small crew, restored every inch of the pumper. It took us 15 years but everything is functional and it looks out of this world! Because of this, I feel a strong connection to Travel Town. But more than anything, I want to give back and help keep the park alive to bring excitement to children and adults who love trains. I want to help spread the same excitement on their face that I see on my son's face.

What have your learned most about yourself, about volunteering, about leading or following a project, etc. that you would like to share with the members?

For 30 years I worked in a profession where I had to solve problems. Working on these old trains and cars, many times, requires the same level of thinking. I love the challenge and really love to learn how the "old timers" overcame their challenges with the technology they had on hand. When I'm handling old parts and items, many times I find myself thinking about the men and women in history that touched these same items.

Why should other folks come out and volunteer at the Museum?

In general, I believe that being a volunteer for any organization is beneficial. It is always a great way to make new friends and meet people from different walks of life. At Travel Town, it is a great way to give back to a place that has sparked many children's imagination and creativity for decades. The volunteer activities that our younger volunteers take part in will build skills that they will carry with them the rest of their lives. One minute you may be learning how to do yard work, the next you are starting a train engine. There are opportunities to paint, work with many types of tools, or learn how to "water a battery". Other assignments may be to give guided tours, interact and read children's books to our child members, setting up play train areas, or sorting and organizing donated items. I guess what I'm trying to say is that the volunteer program at Travel Town is very unique because of all the different jobs you can do.



We've been working on the Railroad – Group Volunteer Opportunities

We were visited by the Stacy Witbeck company in August who brought a great group of volunteers who helped us with facilities cleanup. Some of the group cleaned and swept out our Arcadia Depot, others helped clean the passenger cars, and others even cleaned out the cabs of the Charley Atkins and Baldwin locomotives. Afterward, the group was given a tour through the sleeping cars and then had a lovely picnic in the Union Pacific picnic area. We have had other businesses donate a day of service in the past, folks like Warner Brothers Studios, CarMax in

We've been workin' on the Railroad - Dining Car Update

How do you paint the roof of a railroad car? Very carefully! This summer has been spent repairing, washing, priming and now painting the roof of dining car 3669. Because it is a heavyweight car in our Passenger car consist (a consist, pronounced CON-sist, is a group of train cars), we have decided to return it to the more appropriate 1920's paint scheme of a black roof and Pullman green sides, not the mustard yellow livery of the other Union Pacific cars.

Inside, more progress has been made in purchasing and fitting the windowshades for the dining car. Each windowshade was manufactured by the Adams & Westlake Company, the original manufacturer for railroad windowshades. Each windowshade costs around \$1000, and there are 12 windows in the diner. This is why we have to fundraise so diligently, and why
